Martin also maintained a robust pro bono practice, where he helped to successfully represent a class of Asian American and Hispanic voters in a Voting Rights Act case that changed Lowell, Massachusetts' election system; defend the former head of the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency in a lawsuit against Newsmax, the Trump Campaign, and political commentator and attorney Joseph DiGenova; and advise candidates for elected office on how to navigate the constitutional challenges created by COVID policies on Massachusetts' ballot signature requirements.
